



Basic Day Shapes

Here's a summary of the most common "Day Shapes" displayed that recreational sailors or powerboaters will encounter. There are of course, many more, and attendance on a powerboat or sailing course will explain more. The main point to take away is if you're unsure about what another vessel's intentions are, or who has right of way, take a conservative approach and give them plenty of room.

Vessels at Anchor – Anchor Ball




Vessels at anchor should display a black sphere from their forward rigging.



Vessels Underway - Motoring Cone

While a powerboat or ship underway is usually clear, there are some situations where motoring cones are displayed. Fishing vessels typically display motoring cones (two black cones pointing towards one another). Equally, a yacht that has its engine on, even if its sails are still up and using them primarily for propulsion, is technically now a powerboat. It should display a motoring cone and should be treated as a powerboat by other vessels.



Divers in Water

Finally, vessels that have launched divers from them display the following flag. All vessels should give the dive boat a very wide berth.
